Homewood Museum

3400 N. Charles Street | Charles Village

Explore this museum on the Homewood campus that traces its history back to 1801, when it was built by the son of Charles Carroll (one of the men who signed the Declaration of Independence).

Fort McHenry

2400 E. Fort Avenue | Locust Point

Tour the Fort that defended the Baltimore Harbor in the War of 1812 from an attack by the British Navy. Learn how events at this fort inspired Francis Scott Key to write our national anthem.



B&O Railroad Museum

901 W. Pratt Street | Pigtown

Did you know the B&O Railroad was the first commercial long distance track? View the almost 200 pieces of locomotives that tell the history of railroad technology.

Edgar Allan Poe House

203 N. Amity Street, #2501 | Lexington

Visit the home where Edgar Allan Poe wrote some of his short stories which set the stage for the genres of mystery, horror, and science fiction.

Star-Spangled Banner Flag House

844 E. Pratt Street | Jonestown

With 15 stars and 15 stripes, Mary Pickersgill sewed the flag that flew over Fort McHenry in the Battle of Baltimore. Learn about her family's history and the flag in her former home.

Reginald F. Lewis Museum

830 E. Pratt Street | Jonestown

With over 10,000 objects, the museum documents the authentic voice of the history and culture of African Americans in Maryland.

Seven Foot Knoll Lighthouse

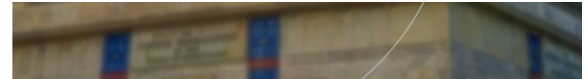
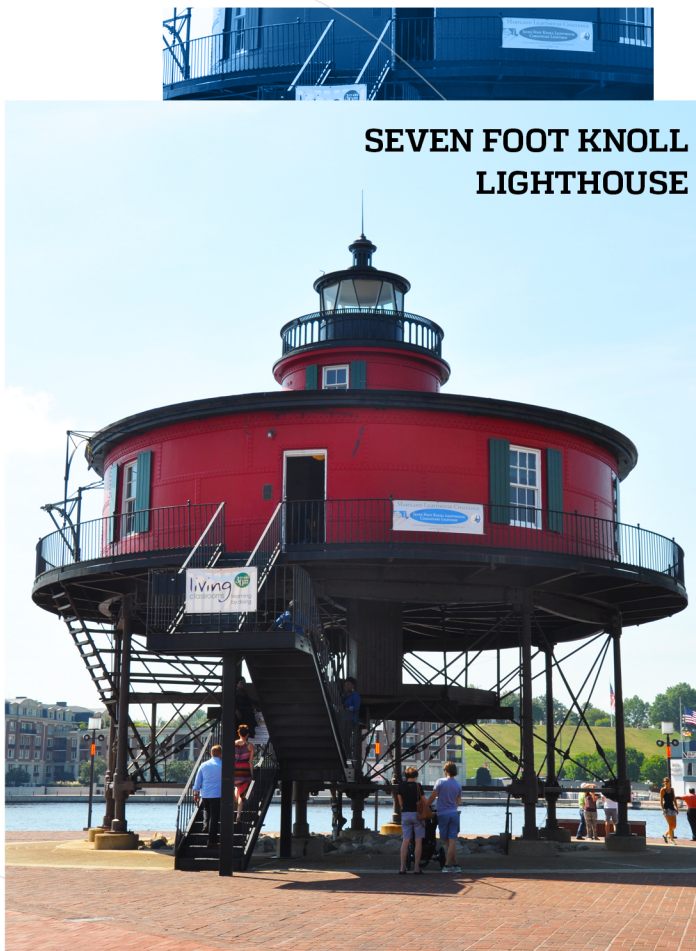
801 E. Fayette Street | Inner Harbor

Tour one of the oldest Chesapeake lighthouses still in existence. The artifact collections tell stories of the ships and lighthouse, and thousands of brave sailors, who worked and lived here.

USS Constellation

301 E. Pratt Street | Inner Harbor

Take a tour of this historic ship located in the Inner Harbor and hear about its history as a war vessel powered by sails.



Washington Monument

699 N. Charles Street | Mount Vernon

Climb the 227 steps in the first major monument built to honor George Washington and get a beautiful view of the Mt. Vernon Neighborhood.

Baltimore Museum of Industry

1415 Key Highway | South Baltimore

Learn about those who built Baltimore and future projects on the horizon for the city. Engage in tours, hands-on activities, and live reenactments.
